PRESIDENTS COLUMN

Here we are, middle of summer and, at the peak of fishing activities. End of January through March is always a busy schedule with field days and drycasting days. Put the A.A.A. activities on top of these and one could get involved nearly every weekend.

Our field day Wago/Greenough had a reasonable turnout considering the distances involved. Interesting to note where the fish were caught. As expected Wago did have some quality but the quantity was not there - many fishing hours with zero results, whereas Greenough (but only at spots for those in the know) really produced quantity, plus one very good Mullet - Hey fella's did you notice who caught it.

Opinion on Wago by most was that the moon phase was wrong. Spots that usually fire were only good for drowning mullets. The hot shot was the drive back on the road through Eneabba - Pnew!

This brings up the selection for the forthcoming year of fishing venues. While the Committee has the responsibility of selecting some, no decision on how this will be done has been made. However review of the past year's result, indicates our current method could have room for improvement in voting by the club members. One idea that has been put forward has been a straight analytical approach - review of our club records, whatever venue gave the best result for that month, will be the venue - full stop.

The Committee will look at all ideas - however, the above is under serious consideration. Another item that could be looked at is the phases of the moon, general weather patterns etc. However with this year's activities also having to fit in with A.A.A. activities, selection trials etc., as well as our own reallocating weekends other than our general method could pose some problems. - Please feed any ideas you have to members of the Committee.

On this subject of ideas - remember if you have any changes to our constitution or rules they must be lodged, in writing, to the Secretary.

- Note - As our constitution is a requirement of our "Incorporation" or charter, to change this document requires a great deal of thought, effort and in fact money to make the change legal.
- Our Rules and Regulations are working guidelines and are not subject to such stringent requirements - a written change to the Secretary and a vote is required.

The latter is an area where different ways of operating or updating etc. could be beneficial to the club.

(Last years was a bag limit on all species of fifty - with a growing awareness of environment and resource availability this was a well thought out change to our rules.)

Hence if you have any ideas, please put it in writing. Read both the Constitution and Etiquette Book carefully to understand the mechanics of making a change. And make sure whatever you change or add is referenced to the applicable, Document, heading, Paragraph. (If you have a problem drafting the item, the President, Secretary, or Treasurer can assist.)

Some of the recent tightening up slackness on our rules etc. in running the club have been undertaken on the basis of making it easier for the next team to take up the controls. Perhaps it has rubbed off on you. If so maybe a rule change is appropriate - but think about it, like most actions there are generally positive benefits and negative benefits. If the position benefits outweigh the negative then its likely to pass. but put any idea to this test first.

Also on the subject of change, note that it's not too far off for next years selection of Committee members. So think about getting involved.

On noting that our next round of yearly activities are being planned, the Annual Dinner Dance/Trophy Night venue has been set for 9th June (Saturday Night) at Memberly Lodge.

Last years was a terrific social so make a note in your calendar.

Sunday dawned clear and warm and fishless, a real anticlimax from the night before. Fortunately Ian has a licence and craypot which we put to good use by procuring a touch of lunch garnished with Neil's seafood dressing, real hardships these fishing trips.

No prizes for guessing where we were going to fish that afternoon. We arrived early but the fish didn't, in fact they were very slow coming. It slowly developed into one of those sessions where for no reason at all one person gets all or most of the bites and fortunately, for a change, my luck was in, while Graham couldn't win a trick and I believe he was still a few fish short of his quota for the trip. However, he wasn't complaining too much, its a long time since our ice box had over 100 Tailor in it.

After tea, the long day quickly caught up with us and soon sleep overtook us. Little or no fishing was done on Monday, only Neil perserved for a feed of Herring but caught a bucketful of blowies instead. Final ritual for the weekend was to go and "Pull the Pot". Suffice to say brunch was well received then it was down with the camp and we bid farewell to our genial company, then slipped off down the long track to home.

WAGOE FIELD DAY REPORT - JANUARY L.W.E.

The weather at Wagoë was a combination of reasonable temperatures, kept that way by strong south-east winds. So fishing was fairly difficult but we didn't sweater - only on the run home on Monday - Pnew!!

We had a low swell and calm seas which meant morning fishing off the reefs was easy. The group at Wagoë, 16 in all, were around, evenly split between the lagoon area and Wagoë proper and the Lucky/Disaster Bay area.

As can be seen from the results there were some good quality fish taken. Hewie's 8.5 kg Spaniard and Filomena's 6.5 kg Golden Trevally stood out at Wagoë. Down near Lucky and Disaster Bay, Lofty caught a 4.25 kg Spaniard and two visitors Morton Lockett and Les Leicester, Brian's brother, caught a 5.5 kg Pink Snapper and a 3.75 kg Tailor respectively. Not bad for two visitors.

The rumours about the Wagoë area being crowded out by many fishing clubs proved to be unfounded. There seemed plenty of room near Lucky and Disaster Bays. The reef north of Disaster Bay seemed easily able to accommodate many more anglers than our fairly small group.

On comparing the Wagoë and Grennough legs of this field day there seems much to be said for both areas. It probably boils down to a case of quantity verses quality. This is reflected in the results and thus a successful combination of different types of fishing.

WAGOE: Conditions fine, strong SE-SW winds slowly lessening over the L.W.E. Slight sea, low swell. winds kept temperature reasonable.
