DRY CASTING April 1st, 1962.

There were only 17 members turned out for the last casting day of the 1961 - 62 competition, and although the numbers were small the enthusiasm was there, and with the conditions being rather pleasant everyone seemed to have an enjoyable if not completely successful morning. There were 7 members cast 300 ft. or better, J. Bellman, N. Knight, R. Lilly, R. Tucker, R. Jensen, W. Bridger and K. Mulvay. J. Bellman cast three beauties of 369, 363 & 356. The highest scorers in this event were N. Knight 309 - 165 - 174, R. Tucker 294 - 162 - 456 and N. Wilkerson 262 - 180 - 442.

The scoring in the Double Handed Accuracy was not the best, perhaps the slight cross wind had something to do with it. Hal Neil topped the score with a nice 46/80 then came Keith Mulvay with 39/80 and Bill Bridger with a 32/80. There were only 4 members scored with all four casts H. Neil, K. Mulvay, W. Bridger and N. Wilkerson, then we had the highlight of the morning with Bob Jensen's Bull, the first we have had for quite a while, these Bob seem to have a mortgage on the Bull.

The Single Handed Accuracy saw some good scoring with a tie for first between Bob Tucker and Rob Kildahl with 24/40 each, with Noel Wilkerson only one behind 23/40. There were seven members scored with all four casts, R. Kildahl, N. Knight, I McLennan, R. Tucker, R. Lilly, W. Bridger and N. Wilkerson. Bill Bridger and Noel Wilkerson finished off a good day on the Accuracy events as they both scored with all 8 casts.

GARDEN ISLAND FIELD DAY, 14th & 15th APRIL.

Weather conditions: North-East winds, heavy ground swell pounding the Beaches. Hot conditions prevailed during the day and many members took the opportunity of having a refreshing dip in the sea to cool off.

Twenty-four members, one Visitor and seven Juniors attended the Venue, which was a drop in attendance figures, no doubt caused by the hot sultry weather.

The early boat was poorly patronised, as only seven anglers were on board, though several of the boys did travel over on the 9 o'clock boat. John Griffiths and the two young Newton boys arrived on the early boat and promptly headed for their favourite spot down South, which once again gave a most satisfactory result.

On the second boat Ron Shirley related his experiences at the Murchison to those who would listen to him without going green with envy, and they were breath taking stories of big fish. Spanish Mackerel, Tuna etc., which were only too ready to do battle with the poor unfortunate angler who was intrepid enough to try himself out against them. It seems that the Murchison is a must.

The afternoon boat brought over the balance of the members who attended the Field Day, and it wasn't long before they were off to the HOT SPOT of their choice.

Ron McQueen and myself strolled up near the Gun position where we found the swell very heavy and racing right up over the normal beach area, it was quite difficult to find a good spot with conditions the way they were. In the meantime Phil Neri and Ron Shirley had by now walked around the North end and were busy selecting their favourite spot. Norm Giles was conning his "hot spot" which, however, was filled with weed. After fishing for several hours and losing several rigs I strolled down to see how Phil and Ron were making out and Ron had done it again. A Blue Pointer Shark - a beauty of 20½ lbs and off went the Shark Award.

Just as well as the season was ending or else Norm Clark may have had some worries. Ron also had a good chance of winning the Points per lb. Section and we were all wondering how Bob Lilly was making out up North further. I don't know whether Ron was unlucky or Bob was lucky, for Ron finished up in this Section only one point behind Bob. Too close for comfort, Bob! Ron also played a giant Sting-ray for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours which finally broke off, if not I'm sure that Ron would still be there working that Ray.

Shortly after 10.0 o'clock we headed back to Base and on the way we passed our good friends Nick and Charlie Crouch. Nick by the way had several Tailor to show for his efforts. Charlie as usual was battling on. The heavy ground swell was cutting well back into the beach making casting very difficult and also walking as the angle of the beach was very steep.

Back at the Hut we gathered around and passed our news and made inquiries as to what other fish had been captured while we built up our strength over a cuppa. Gradually the boys all came in and after much bantering, and brews, everyone started to settle down, but not for long, for about 4 o'clock it was on again and the lads started moving off for early morning efforts. Ron McQueen and myself decided to visit the Nick Crouch Hot Spot in the morn, thought the ground swell was still crashing in, with sand stirring far out to sea, and once again the Tailor failed to show. Shortly after seven Ron and I strolled back to the first bay to see Norm Giles landing a fine salmon and Cec. Houghton, Bob Jensen and Rick were also there trying their skill. -- Little later Bob Jensen landed a $9\frac{1}{2}$ lb Salmon on his Single Handed Rod, which was quite an effort. Cec had a wow of time and though he lost several Salmon he landed one weighing $9\frac{1}{4}$ lb. Incidentally he caught this fish on his first cast of the day. Cec. is going to be someone to watch in this coming Season.

Back at the Hut the Weigh-in was being carried on at a furious rate and just as things started to slow up in arrived John Griffith with his two "boys". John took off the Heaviest Bag of Scaled Fish and this lad is really on the job and his unlimited enthusiasm must be seen to be believed and he had a mighty tussle in an endeavour to retrieve a Salmon from the jaws of a hungry Shark and after much guile he achieved the almost impossible by landing the Salmon with only a small portion missing. Bob Tucker tried to hook the Shark with one of John's herring, the Shark snapped at it, but had a good look at Bob and spat it back at him. (Even Sharks can be fussy with their company. It was good to see "Blue" Hampton along again with his lad, Steven, though I think that Steve must have worn Dad out for "Blue" slept all the way back.

Ted Savage missed a good run down there in the morning. What ever it was must have indigestion now Ted reckons for he took his whole scaly rig and went through like a Bondi bus. Ian McLennan turned in a good bag of Fish as did the Newton boys. (I wish they would show me how they do it Ed.) My congratulations to the Award winners and my many thanks for the help I received on the Venue, and to those who helped to sweep and clean the Hut out.

The next Field Day is to be held at Golden Bay, so ro l up lads and let's start the season with a good turn-up. Weigh-in 8 till 9 o'clock.

It has been a grand year chaps and we exceeded last year's poundage with the final figure of 1,856 lb. of Scale Fish.

Incidentally Rick Jensen caught a wopper stopper herring which might be a Club record as it weighed 18 ozs. It looked more like a Salmon Trout than a herring. Good work Rick, and Phil Neri is to be commended on his mighty effort in gaffing Ron's Shark with such a short gaff in that rough sea.

In regards to our next Field Day at Golden Bay, members must report in to the Field Day Organiser by 4 o'clock at the Club Sign which will be placed in a conspicuous position. The onus is on the member who arrives late to report to the F.D.O. and not to take it for granted that the F.D.O. knows he is there. If a member arrives very late he must report to the F.D.O. in the morning, otherwise he will not be credited as having attended the Field Day. O.K.?

To all members who have attended Field Days and who have assisted me at various times I would like to offer my thanks for your help, and hope that I will see you all again in our new fishing season.

To the winners of the many Field Day Awards during the past year I would like to offer my congratulations and to the winners of our Field Day Fishing Sections I would also like to offer my congratulations. There have been some good fish caught and several of the Sections have been touch and go over the last few outings. To those members who missed out this year, remember there is another season starting next month (May) - so be in it! The competition should be keen, and you have to be in it to win it. Besides, it's on Field Days that you get to know the boys.

As has been mentioned the weight of Scale Fish caught on Field Days, though not as many as we would have liked, reached 1,856 lb for our 1961 - 62 Season, was really not too bad considering the conditions we had to fish in on quite a few Field Days. The year before we caught 1,628 lb. So as members can see we have improved or exceeded our previous years catch by 228 lb. Let's hope that our 1962 - 63 Season we will exceed this by a much higher figure. (I can assure you Jim that it won't be for the want of trying. Ed.)

ANGLERS ARE GENTLEMEN

The complete change necessary, regardless of a man's appearance character and association, to develop into an angler, and the comparison between an angler and a fisherman were discussed by "Marlin" in a recent edition of the Gosford (N.S.W.) "Times".

"Every angler is a fisherman, but a great many fishermen are not anglers; all anglers are gentlemen, regardless of their business calling, appearance, character and associations.....The angler fishes for the sport of the game. The thrill of a big fish taken on a light rod and gear is something known only to the true angler.....To them the number of fish caught matters little. The thrill that counts is the one of catching fish, which in many cases, is pound-for-pound the same weight as the breaking strain of their lines, and sometimes even greater".

The thrill experienced by an angler in landing that big fish on light gear is far greater than that of a fisherman catching a dozen fish, especially when the odds are all in his favour. The angler's sport lies in pitting his skill against the cunning of the fish.

FALLACY OF FISH YARNS.

According to American Scientists, the old story about fish being affected by weather conditions is just another fish yarn. They reached the following conclusions investigating the conditions of the fish in relation to weather variations.

Fish pay no attention to the weather, and how many fish an angler catches has nothing to do with the barometer - whether it was rising or falling, the catch was about the same.

Experiments were carried out on catching fish on days of differing wind velocity, sky cover or cloudiness, showers or steady rain, the results showed that such conditions have nothing to do with either good or bad catches.
