Make sure you're at the weigh in !

PEACEFUL BAY
0th SEPT.—2nd OCT.
FOR MEMBERS FROM PERTH
REQUIRING ONLY A 2WD AND 4WD VEHICLE'S

Follow the Albany Highway until you come to Mt. Barker, and follow it around to the left until you come to a tee junction about 10 km's where you should see a sign with road until you come to the South Coast Highway. 10 km's to Denmark town centre. Drive thru town and the caravan park is approximately 43 km's from Denmark. Keep the turn off is only about 1 km past the Tavern on your way to the caravan park.

The caravan park is fairly well protected from the elements and has all of the amenities you would expect to find. Diesel and petrol is available at the shop, plus limited stocks of fishing tackle along with bread, milk, papers and food supplies, should you require them. L.P.G. is also available.

I hope this long weekend type of venue will encourage more of our member's wives, girlfriends or what ever to attend. A good rollup to this one, may see us hold more like it, in the future.

PLACES TO FISH

There are many places to fish along this part of the coast line and some need to be treated with respect, so where ever you go, **BE CAREFULL AND DON'T FISH ALONE ON ROCKS**. The western boundary will be the Blue Holes at Bellanger Beach, with West Cape Howe the eastern boundary. Other places in between are, Conspicuous Bay, Rame Head, The Gap, Kingie Rocks, Foul Bay, (including The Irwin Inlet), Boat Harbour, William's Bay, Parry's Beach, Ocean Beach at Denmark, with Knapp Head, Bornholm and West Cape Howe to the east of Denmark. Fish species you might catch in these area's are:- Herring, Whiting, Trevally, Cobbler, Salmon, Bonito, Sharks, the odd Tailor, plus back breaking Samson Fish, up to 35 kgs.

Members with only a conventional car will be able to fish all of the places mentioned between Peaceful Bay and Denmark. However, should you wish to fish some of the other places I have listed, just ask one of our 4WD club members for a lift, I am sure they would not mind.

If you missed the discussion on Peaceful Bay at the meeting, on the places to fish and how to get there, just ask me at the caravan park. I hope to have map's of the area to give you.

Western Boundary:- The Blue Holes at Bellanger Beach. 4WD vehicle's only.

How to get there:- Follow South Coast Highway towards Nornalup. Turn left into Station Rd. about 1.5 km's east of Nornalup. Follow this road into National Park and continue on until road changes to a bush track. Stay on the track, do not turn off until you come to the first sandy hill. When you see the hill, (let tyres down to 18 p.s.i.) turn right and make your way around the hill, where you should come to a sleeper track going up, over the hill. Turn right at the top of the hill and make your way down to the beach. About 2 km's to your left there is a rocky out crop, which, at times cannot be passed due to the weather and tides. To the right you can travel for quite a few km's if beach conditions allow. This beach is generally very easy to get in and out of. At this time of the year there should be a lot of good gutters and holes. Park your vehicle well back from the water as it is usually flat and the in coming tide, runs along way up the beach

Fish Species:- Herring, Whiting, Trevally, Salmon, Sharks and Mulloway are caught in this area.

Conspicuous Bay:- Is an option for those with a conventional 2WD vehicle only.

Drive back along Peaceful Bay Road for 2km's and turn left into Picifolia Road. Follow the sign's and after a 10 km drive, you should be in the car park at the bay. A short walk down some wooden steps and you are on the beach. This beach is shallow, but you can still catch some good fish here.

Fish Species:- Herring, Whiting, Bream, Trevally, Salmon trout can be caught in this bay and there is always the possibility of bigger fish after dark.

Rame Head and Herring Rock:- 4WD territory only. 2 sandy bays with some rocky out crops at Rame Head. Herring Rock plus other places on the way out to Rame Head. This is generally an easy track to drive along. However, it can become quite over grown, so take care with rods.

Fish Species:- Herring, Whiting, Bream, Tarwhine, Wrasse, Cobbler, Salmon, Shark and Mulloway.

The Gap and Kingie Rocks:- 4WD needed to reach these two places. There are several places you can fish on the way out, however the best fishing seems to be at Kingie Rocks. If you decide to fish this area you must be very carefull of the swell. Directions and map's given out at caravan park

Lives have been lost at this spot, so be warned.

Fish high and dry and take a long handled gaff (20 feet) and never fish alone on the rocks.

Fish Species:- Herring, Wrasse, Bonito, Salmon, Sharks, Mulloway and back breaking samson fish up to 35 kg's are not uncommon at this spot. Midgies can be most annoying here around dusk.

Peaceful Bay is only a short walk from the caravan park and is easy fishing with a sandy bottom

Foul bay can be driven along by a 2WD vehicle for quite a few km's if the conditions are good.

The Irwin Inlet can also be reached via the beach and does have it's moments, especially if the river mouth has broken through. This can become very soft so drive carefully if you decide to cross over.

Professional fisherman bring in their nets on this beach and do have right of way. You are quite welcome to watch and a bucket full of herring could be bought for \$5-00 not so long ago.

This is a good way to buy fresh bait for the big ones if you don't have any. Cost may have gone up.

Fish Species:- Herring, Whiting, Flathead, Flounder, Trevally, Salmon, Sharks and Mulloway.

Heading east, towards Denmark, there are many places to fish which you can get to with a 2WD vehicle. Boat Harbour, William's Bay, Parry's Beach and the Ocean Beach front at Denmark, to name a few, with other spots in between. All can produce the above mentioned fish species with some big Trevally and Salmon in particular around Parry's Beach. Some of these places may require a short walk to reach a good spot. Just follow the sign's off South Coast Highway.

East of Denmark is more for the 4WD vehicles with the 3 main places being Knapp Head, Bornholm and West Cape Howe which can all produce " BIG " fish. Bornholm can be difficult to get out of at times so I would **not** recommend this spot for the inexperienced driver, or a vehicle which may be lacking a bit of grunt. **Fish Species:-** As above. Directions and maps given out at Peaceful Bay.

When : 1957.

3. The State Drycasting Championships are to be held at the Yokine Reserve on Sun. 26th of Nov. 1995. A meeting at 89 Clontarf St. Sorrento, will be held on Mon. 23rd of Oct. 1995 with G. Holman for all people interested in participating. 8.00 p.m. sharp.

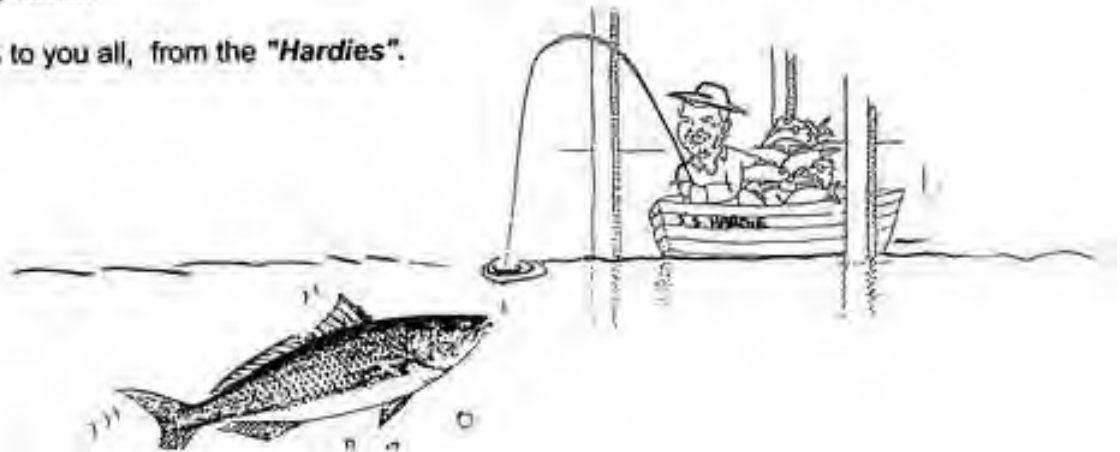

S.C.A.C. RECORDER'S REPORT

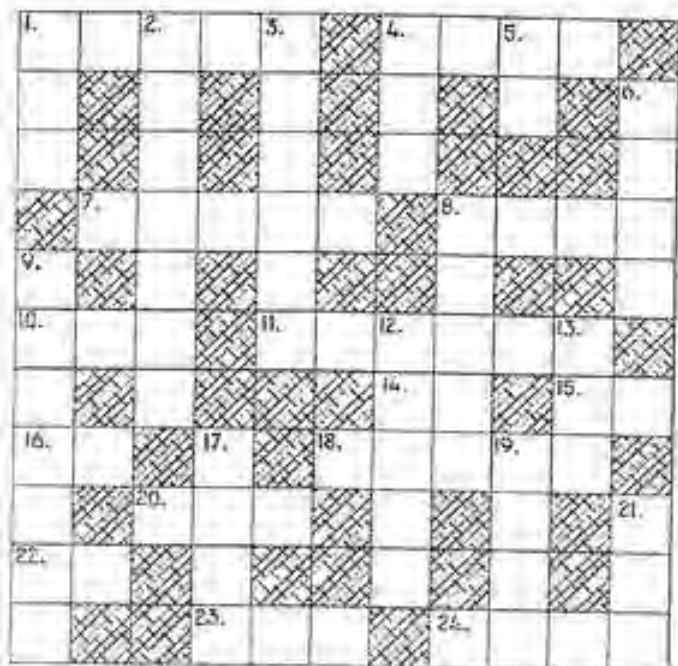

salt
2.5cm piece of green ginger

Cooks Corner

Chinese Bream

3 tablespri soy sauce
6 shallots
5cm piece of green ginger extra
3 tablespn oil



Two thirds fill a shallow pan with water, add salt and crushed ginger and bring to the boil. Cook for five minutes to allow the flavours to be released. Reduce heat and add the fish, cook for ten minutes. Remove fish, drain well and put onto heated serving dishes.

While fish is cooking, peel extra ginger and cut into thin strips. peel shallots into diagonal slices. Pour soy sauce over fish and sprinkle with ginger and shallots. Heat oil until nearly boiling and pour over the fish. Yum!
