Welcome to our new fishing year. A special welcome to members who have recently joined the club. We trust you enjoy the club activities and the company of other members. Special thanks must go to the immediate past president, Eric Parker, for handing over the reins of the club in such a healthy condition. Club membership is on the rise, and books balance nicely, and the house at Kalbarri will be paid for at the end of the financial year. We shall be exploring ideas with you on what to do with the injection of funds received from the rental of this house.

Over the past year the club has had some notable wins in both teams and individual events in fishing and casting competitions. We made a good start into the current years activities by taking off the senior drycasting AAA teams event in July, with our mini juniors as runners up. For those of you that enjoy competitive events surfcasters have always fielded strong teams. We hope to see some of the newer faces make their way into these events.

Field days for both casting and fishing are the best ways for the less experienced club members to become more proficient in these skills. Observe and ask questions of the older hands. Fishermen, being fisherman, will have quite different and even directly opposite opinions, types of tackle, etc. Try them out - What works for one does not always work for another. Find what you feel comfortable with and gives you results, then start refining.

Some of this was evident at Rotto, our last field day - some of the new members and visitors followed the old hands on to the reefs. Those that didn't have wet suits or waders wished they did. Some were using small softer kirby style hooks but if you looked carefully you could pick up with salmon were using a flight of 3/0 or 4/0 tarpon hooks. Each field day venue will require slightly different techniques depending on winds, seas, type of fish, bait, rock or beach locations, etc. Being at the right place at the right time with the right bait and gear and the right attitude will result in the better catches. Our gun fisherman do this consistently. Experience and observation will get you into this category too.

The success of Surfcasters is very dependent on you, the individual member, participating in all of our events. Hence when planning your activities note the upcoming events, usually shown in our Reel Talk, and see if you can attend. Our committee works hard at trying to give you the types of activities and venues that the majority indicate they wish to attend. If you have any ideas you feel might be of interest to

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the club, please bring them up at our meetings. Maybe you feel a little uncomfortable in standing up in front of your fellow members; perhaps you can discuss your idea with one of the committee members on an informal basis and he can/ you can put it forward. Alternatively write a letter to the secretary. We are always open to discussing new ideas.

The committee's main objective within the guidelines of the constitution is to give you the member, a club that you feel proud to belong to, and activities that you enjoy. Any feedback from you on any activities, and by feedback this can be positive or negative comments, assists the committee in achieving these aims.
